National Reconciliation Week—Kerang Community Walk

On Wednesday, 28 May 2025, the Gannawarra Shire community came together in an inspiring show of unity and respect for the 11th annual Reconciliation Week Walk in Kerang. Organised by the Gannawarra Shire Council in collaboration with the Kerang Elders and Leaders Group, Mallee District Aboriginal Services (MDAS), and Northern District Community Health (NDCH). The event commenced with flag raising ceremony in Victoria Street in front of the largest crowd to date, drawing around 350 community members.

Over 250 students from 9 schools and the Gannawarra Children's Centre joined the walk and festivities. Thanks to flood recovery funding covering bus travel students from remote schools, Koondrook and Murrabit were able to attend. The event was rich in Aboriginal culture featuring a Welcome to

The event was rich in Aboriginal culture featuring a Welcome to Country by Warren Hall Jnr and a Smoking Ceremony led by Hack Webster, who also shared his cultural knowledge of native plants used in the ceremony. Yorta Yorta singer Madi Colville Walker performed cultural storytelling through song, and Aunty Lil Murray read the picture book *Country*, with its pages projected on a large screen.

Art displayed at the event enhanced the cultural atmosphere with local Indigenous artworks—including pieces by children and youth groups, Kethawil Pembenguuk and Tyipen Kwe along with adult artists.

The event fostered cultural awareness, strengthened relationships, and provided a platform for Aboriginal voices. The Kerang Reconciliation Week Walk stands as a powerful example of how local communities can come together to honour

history, celebrate culture, and build a future of reconciliation — one step at a time.

REPAIRS TO FLOOD-DAMAGED ROADS COMPLETED

The Gannawarra's recovery from the 2022 floods has reached a key milestone, with repairs to all Gannawarra Shire Council-managed roads completed.

Work has occurred since late 2022 to repair the more than 600 kilometres of Council-managed roads damaged during major flooding along the Avoca and Loddon rivers, Pyramid Creek and their tributaries.

"Council thanks residents and motorists for their understanding as these works occurred throughout the municipality," Council Chief Executive Officer, Geoff Rollinson said.

"These works were funded thanks to joint Commonwealth and State Government-funded Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements; however, like many of the municipalities impacted by the 2022 floods, receiving State Government approval for repairs delayed our ability to roll out these works.

"Now these works are complete, residents and motorists will be able to travel to and from their properties via the quickest way possible, as well as provide greater connections between farming enterprises and services." Contractors completed the repairs to sealed and unsealed roads along with a number of culverts across the municipality that were damaged as a result of the flood event.

Meanwhile, Council continues to advocate for improvements along Regional Roads Victoria-managed roads in the municipality. These include the Loddon Valley Highway (B260), Murray Valley Highway (B400) and other local roads identified on maps or signage with a C2## prefix.

"These roads are important to the Gannawarra, as they connect residents and services to our major towns and other regional locations," Mr Rollinson said.

"It is important that these roads are maintained to a level our community expects, as it will ensure ease of mind for residents and visitors alike."



COMMUNITY CONNECTION THROUGH ART & CRAFT

Over the past two years, funding from Emergency Recovery Victoria through the Gannawarra Flood Recovery Program has supported a wide range of events, programs, and activities across the Shire, as part of a community-led recovery initiative.

Among these were a series of art and craft workshops coordinated by Kerang Neighbourhood House, held in Kerang, Koondrook, Murrabit, and Benjeroop. These workshops used creativity as a powerful connector, bringing residents together in a relaxed, welcoming environment to learn new skills and express themselves artistically. Activities included Kokedama making, mosaics, fluid art, weaving, and wreath making—each led by a talented local facilitator.

These creative sessions not only encouraged artistic exploration but also played an important role in strengthening community connections and supporting emotional wellbeing throughout the recovery period.

As the funding for this initiative has now concluded, the Gannawarra Shire Council extends its thanks to Emergency Recovery Victoria and all community members and facilitators who contributed to the success of the program. The positive impact of these activities will continue to be felt across the community for years to come.

BUSH TUCKER GARDEN PROJECT

The bush tucker garden space named "Tyapa Kurra Kahl" meaning "To plant on Country" in Barapa Wamba language is nearing completion at Mallee District Aboriginal Services, Kerang.

The development of the garden is supported by Northern District Community Health, Loddon Mallee Public Health Unit and Gannawarra Shire Council. The garden is being funded by Emergency Recovery Victoria through the Gannawarra Flood Recovery Program.

Designed as a space for the local Aboriginal community to connect with Country, the garden aims to strengthen cultural knowledge around native plants and traditional food practices.

Raised Redgum timber garden beds have been installed and planted with a variety of bush tucker species. Two mural artworks have also been completed, including one proudly displaying the garden's name, "Tyapa Kurra Kahl," which will be positioned at the garden's entrance. Much of the landscaping has been finalised, with natural pathways, mulch, a firepit area, shade sail, and a yarning circle now in place.

Next steps will include planting a diverse selection of native species such as kangaroo grass, chocolate lilies, native violets, river mint, and pepper berries. Each plant will be accompanied by signage detailing its cultural significance, traditional uses, and care instructions. A section of native lawn will also be planted, alongside an area of turf.

A community celebration and official opening of the garden is planned for mid-Spring, giving time for the new planted garden to settle and flourish.

ABORIGNAL ART PROJECT ACKNOWLEDGED AT KERANG TECH HIGH SCHOOL

Kerang Tech High School marked the beginning of Term 3 with the official opening of its Aboriginal art mural project on July 22, 2025. This initiative was made possible through partial funding from the Victorian and Commonwealth Governments under the Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA), as part of the Gannawarra Community Flood Recovery Program. Led by local artist Tobie Cameron, the mural was developed in partnership with Aboriginal students throughout the school term. The sweeping artwork brings to life powerful cultural stories, including the Rainbow Serpent, Murray Cod, the local lakes, and the Murray River. The mural will be further enhanced with signage acknowledging Traditional Owners, along with a QR code linking to audio recordings that share the cultural significance of the stories depicted. Hack Webster from Mallee District Aboriginal Services delivered a Welcome to Country and conducted a smoking ceremony during the event. Hack also spoke to students about the meaning of NAIDOC Week and read a prepared presentation on behalf of Tobie Cameron, who was unable to attend.

The striking mural now stands as a special space for reflection, connection, and celebration—offering students and the broader community a place to gather and honour the rich cultural heritage of the region.





The project was supported by Gannawarra Shire Council, Northern District Community Health, and Victoria Police, all of whom attended the opening ceremony in a show of community collaboration.

The 47th Annual Australian Tractor Pull Championships wowed crowds in Quambatook on Easter Saturday with one of the event's biggest-ever turnouts. Featuring modified and vintage tractors, 102 trophies were awarded across categories. The highlight was a dazzling night event under lights. With food, kids'



entertainment, and a car show, the family-friendly day was a roaring success in perfect weather.

Council praised the strong community turnout and noted the project's success in creating a safer, more welcoming town centre for residents, visitors, and local businesses.




BARAPA BARAPA CULTURAL WALK

Work is underway to redevelop signage for the Reedy Lake Cultural Walk, located along the edge of Middle Reedy and Reedy

Lakes. Originally established in 2008, the walk has since fallen into disrepair. This important site showcases the deep cultural significance of the area to the Barapa Barapa people, including features such as culturally modified trees and evidence of traditional life, where the lakes provided food, tools, and a strong spiritual connection to Country. The 900-metre (one-way) walk offers visitors the chance to learn about Aboriginal heritage while enjoying the region's diverse native flora and fauna. Once restored, it will again serve as a valuable



educational and cultural experience for the community and visitors alike. Funding for this project has been provided by FRRR and Emergency Recovery Victoria through the Gannawarra Flood Recovery Program.
